

Here is an example of a block quote. This type of quotation is used when the cited work is not paraphrased and exceeds the limit of 40 words. The quotes that count less than 40 words are not indented as a separate paragraph. Instead, they take place in the narrative. Both types of direct quotations are followed by the following information (Author's Surname, date, p. #).

Please keep in mind that it is not encouraged to use block quotes and direct citations multiple times in any academic work unless it is impossible to change and paraphrase the original statement. Instead, summarizing the original work in your own words is preferred.

This is an example of a footnote. All the additional information goes to footnotes. This may include definitions, information about an author, etc. Footnotes are written in New Roman, 10 pt.




